I am still basking in the glow of a glorious Easter worship and celebration. I loved seeing everyone in their Sunday Easter outfits. I loved hearing the squeals and excitement of the children leading up to the Easter Egg hunt. I loved watching people greet one another with care and love.

I watched the children run and gather eggs after our worship service and saw them delight as they discovered what candy was inside. I watched one of the children...one of Emily Eyob's nephews... gather his eggs and then thoughtfully walk around and peer into the baskets of the other children. I watched and wondered what he was doing. Then he would reach in his basket and place an egg or two or three in the other child's basket

depending on what they had. I was struck by what an example this was for all of us. In a culture that tells us to run and gather all we can for ourselves, he knew that he would be happiest if he cared for others. It was a beautiful thing to watch and witness.

A similar phenomenon happened at the cross in front of the church. Freytag's donated some flowers to us this year for our flowered cross. Others brought flowers they had purchased or that they collected from their yards. Many people got to work cutting and arranging the flowers to cover the cross with color and texture and beauty. I loved seeing family and friends gather to take photos in front of the cross. And it struck me that this is indeed what we are called to do. We are to use what we have to create something beautiful (sometimes this is just ourselves!)...something that makes people pause and smile...something that draws people in. We are to work together. Then, we are called to invite others to experience that beauty for themselves – to know and feel that they are worthy and invited and included.

My prayer this Easter season and beyond is that we continue to honor the great commandment given to us just before Easter – to love our neighbors. We can do this by sharing our eggs or our love or by offering grace. And we are to create beauty in this world so others know they are worthy and loved and so they might see glimpses of God's love, grace and joy.

May the peace of God and the hope of the resurrection give you courage and joy this Easter season and always!

April Festivities Around the World



The spiritual meaning of April is a time of growth and moving forward in new and positive ways. It is said to be a time when the warmer weather contributes to happiness and life gets good again. Around the world, April is celebrated in special fashions. Below are a couple of unique ways the season is rejoiced.

Spain: The Seville Feria is one of the most famous and historic festivals in Europe. What began as a cattle fair in 1847 has grown into an extravagant weeklong celebration. The fiesta kicks off with the illumination of thousands of multicolored light bulbs.



"Casetas" belonging to friends and associates welcome guests with offers of food, wine, conversation, singing and "sevillanas," the local version of flamenco dancing. Men dress as farmworkers and women wear flamenco or gypsy dresses.

The fair is filled with ornate carriages for the horse and carriage parade and every afternoon, there are bullfights where participants fight bulls with nothing but wooden sticks. The week of festivities ends with a spectacular fireworks display.



South Korea: The Lotus Lantern Festival celebrates the coming of Spring and is traditionally celebrated with food, dancing and games. Notably, there is an enormous lantern almost 60 feet tall.



Streets, temples and malls are adorned with thousands of lanterns symbolizing the enlightenment of humanity.

Additionally, a lantern is placed in each home which community members light as darkness falls. This indicates a desire for internal peace.

The festival began centuries before the presence of Christianity in Korea when people wished for luck during farming season. Prayers were said to ward off evil spirits by burning paper or oil lamps shaped like lotus flowers.
